BAGGAGE REGULATIONS (Continued)(O) CHECKING OF BAGGAGE BY CARRIER

Except as otherwise provided in this rule, each Carrier will, upon presentation by a fare-paying passenger of a valid ticket covering transportation over the lines of such Carrier, or over the lines of such Carrier and one or more other Carriers, check personal property which is tendered by the passenger for transportation as baggage, when tendered at the city or airport office designated, by the Carrier, and within the times prescribed by such Carrier, but no Carrier will check property so tendered to a point:

- (1) Beyond the destination, or not on the routing, designated on such ticket;
- (2) Beyond a point of stopover;
- (3) Beyond a point of transfer to any other Carrier, if the passenger has declared a valuation in excess of the amounts shown in Paragraph (K) of this rule.
- (4) Beyond a point beyond which reservations have not been confirmed; provided that when, at the time of departure from point of origin of any sector of his trip, passenger has requested continuous connecting carriage on the lines of two or more carriers to a point beyond the point to which reservations have been confirmed, baggage may be checked to such further point;
- (5) Beyond a point at which the passenger is to transfer to connecting flight, and such flight is scheduled to depart from a different airport than that at which the passenger is scheduled to arrive at such point;
- (6) Beyond a point at which the passenger desires to resume possession of such property or any portion thereof; or
- (7) Beyond a point beyond which all applicable charges have not been paid;

(P) DELIVERY OF CHECKED BAGGAGE BY CARRIER

- (1) Checked baggage will be delivered to the bearer of the baggage check upon payment of all unpaid sums due to Carrier under contract of carriage of tariff, and upon return to Carrier of baggage (claim) tag(s) issued in connection with such baggage. Carrier is under no obligation to ascertain that the bearer of the baggage check and baggage (claim) tag is entitled to delivery of the baggage and Carrier is not liable for any loss, damage or expense arising out of or in connection with his failure to so ascertain. Except as otherwise provided in sub-paragraph (3) hereof, delivery will be made at the destination shown on the baggage check.
- (2) If the provisions of sub-paragraph (1) above are not complied with by a person claiming the baggage, Carrier will deliver the baggage only on condition that such person establishes to Carrier's satisfaction his rights thereto, and if required by Carrier, such person shall furnish adequate security to indemnify Carrier for any loss, damage or expense which may be incurred by Carrier as a result of such delivery.
- (3) At the request of the bearer of the baggage (claim) tag(s), checked baggage will be delivered at the place of departure or an intermediate stopping place upon the same conditions as provided for in sub-paragraph (1) hereof, unless precluded by government regulations or unless time and circumstances do not permit. In delivering baggage at the place of departure or at an intermediate stopping place, Carrier shall be under no obligation to refund any charge paid.
- (4) Acceptance of baggage by the bearer of the baggage check and baggage (claim) tag(s) without written complaint at the time of delivery, is presumptive evidence that the baggage has been delivered in good condition and in accordance with the contract of carriage.

The free baggage allowance for each passenger paying the adult First Class or Business Class fare except as otherwise provided will be:

- (a) 2 pieces checked with overall dimensions (length plus breadth plus height) of each not to exceed 62 inches (158 cms.), provided the weight of each piece does not exceed 32 kilos (70 pounds), plus
- (b) 1 or more pieces to be carried on to the aircraft by the passenger and stored under the seat or placed in an enclosed overhead rack in aircraft so equipped, with total overall dimensions not exceeding 45 inches (115 cms.) except where the underseat space facility requires a bag of lesser size.

(2) Economy Class Fares:

The free baggage allowance for each passenger paying the Adult Economy Class fare except as otherwise provided will be:

- (a) 2 pieces checked with overall dimensions that do not exceed 62 inches (158 cms.) provided that the weight of each piece does not exceed 50 lbs (23 kgs.) per piece, a flat rate of EUR/USD 25.00 will be charged: For the first or second baggage exceeding 23 kgs (50 lbs) total weight and for any additional piece normal excess baggage rates apply.

EXCEPTION: For Voyageur (Economy) between USA/Canada and "IATA Europe including Morocco, Tunisia and Algeria (but excluding Libya and Egypt): Alitalia will accept a maximum 1 piece free of charge checked with overall dimension that not exceed 62 inches (158 cm) provided that the weight does not exceed 50 lbs (23 kgs), the charge for excess or oversize baggage will be: USD50/EUR 50/CAD 50 for 2nd piece of baggage up to 23 kg (additional pieces beyond the 2nd will be charged USD/EUR/CAD 200 each) USD 100/EUR 100/CAD 100 for pieces weighing between 23 kg and 32 kg.

- (b) Up to 2 pieces of cabin baggage to be carried on to the aircraft by the passenger and stored under the seat or placed in an enclosed overhead rack in aircraft so equipped, with total overall dimensions not exceeding 9x16x22.5 inches (23x41x57 cm) except where the underseat space facility requires a bag of a lesser size.
 No one piece of carry-on baggage should exceed 22 lbs (10 kg). In addition, they may also bring along a single suit bag provided that when folded it does not exceed size limits (see below) and can be stored in overhead bin.

NOTE: One of the following items can be substituted for the garment bag:

- (1) Briefcase
- (2) Purse
- (3) Lap top type computer

(3) Combined Class Fares

- (a) For through journeys where the passenger travels partly on First Class or Business Class service the free baggage allowance for each portion of the trip shall be that applicable to the class of service for which the fare is paid.

- (b) When a passenger who has paid the First Class or Business Class fare travels on Economy Service the free baggage allowance will be that applicable to the First Class or Business Class service.

(4) Additional Articles

- (a) In addition to the free baggage allowance provided herein, each passenger may carry, without additional charges, at the carrier's discretion, the following personal effects for use in emplaning, deplaning or in flight only when retained in the passenger's custody, except that the items mentioned in Sub-paragraphs vii and viii below may be carried in the passenger or cargo compartment of the aircraft:
 - (i) a handbag, pocketbook or purse, i.e. which is appropriate to normal travelling dress and is not being used as a container for the transportation of articles which would otherwise be regarded as baggage;
 - (ii) an overcoat, wrap or blanket;
 - (iii) an umbrella or walking stick;
 - (iv) a small camera and/or a pair of binoculars;
 - (v) a reasonable amount of reading matter for the flight;
 - (vi) infant's food for consumption in flight;

Items of scuba diving equipment will be accepted as checked baggage and will always be subject to the charges specified below for a single piece whether or not presented as a single piece, but will not be included in determining the free baggage allowance. (For the purpose of this provision one item of scuba-diving equipment is defined as one scuba tank (empty), one scuba regulator, one tank harness, one tank pressure gauge, one mask, two fins, one snorkel, one knife, one speargun and one safety vest).

EXCEPTION 1: (Applicable to/from Mexico and between the U.S.A. and the Caribbean only). Scuba-diving equipment will not be included in determining the free baggage allowance and will always be subject to the charge of USD 12.00/CAD 15.00 per item.

EXCEPTION 2: (Applicable between the U.S.A. and Central America) Scuba-diving equipment will not be included in determining the free baggage allowance and will be subject to a charge of USD 30.00 per piece.

(f) Shooting Equipment (Sporting Firearms)

(i) Items of shooting equipment will be accepted only as checked baggage subject to the conditions specified below. Firearms will be included in determining the free baggage allowance and, when in excess, each item will be subject to the excess baggage charge for a single piece, whether or not presented as a single piece (See Paragraph I below). (For the purpose of this provision one item of shooting equipment is defined as (1) one rifle case containing not more than two rifles, with or without scope, 5 pounds of ammunition, one shooting mat, noise suppressors and small rifle tools; (2) two shotguns and two shotgun cases; (3) one pistol case containing not more than five pistols, 5 pounds of ammunition noise suppressors, one pistol telescope and small pistol tools.

(ii) Conditions of acceptance

(aa) Advance arrangements must be made.

(bb) Firearms must be unloaded and packed in (1) a manufacturer's crushproof type container, manufactured specifically for the firearms or (2) a hard-sided container specifically designed for the same purpose;

(cc) Baggage containing hand guns must be locked with a key or lock combination in possession of the passenger only and the bag must be of the hard-side type;

(dd) Baggage containing firearms will be transported in an area, other than the cockpit, that is inaccessible to passengers;

(ee) Baggage containing firearms will not knowingly be accepted for transportation at point of origin or at an online or interline connecting point unless a declaration, signed and dated on the day the baggage is accepted for transportation, is attached to the outside of the case declaring that firearms are not loaded;

EXCEPTION: When firearms are contained in hard-sided cases or other baggage not specifically designed for carrying firearms, the declaration must be placed inside the suitcase or other baggage.

Ammunition not to exceed 5 pounds per passenger must be packed in the manufacturer's original package or securely packed in fiber, wood or metal and the ammunition inside the container must be protected against shock and secured against movement. The passenger shall make a written declaration confirming that the above provisions are met.

(ff) The maximum gross weight of ammunition accepted for carriage on any one aircraft is limited to 100 pounds.

EXCEPTION: (Applicable between the U.S.A. and Central America) Shooting equipment will not be included in determining the free baggage allowance and will be subject to a charge of USD 30.00 per piece.

(g) Skiing Equipment

Items of skiing equipment will be accepted as checked baggage. Skiing equipment will be included in determining the free baggage allowance and when in excess each item will be subject to the excess baggage charge for a single piece whether or not presented as a single piece (See Paragraph I) below). (For the purpose of this provision one item of skiing equipment is defined as one pair of skis, one pair of ski poles, one pair of ski bindings and one pair of ski boots).

EXCEPTION 1: (Applicable between the U.S.A. and Central America) Skiing equipment will not be included in determining the free baggage allowance and will be subject to a charge of USD 30.00 per piece.

EXCEPTION 2: (Applicable between the U.S.A. and Area 3) Ski equipment will be included in determining the free baggage allowance and, when in excess, each item will be subject to 50 percent of the excess baggage charge for a single piece, whether or not presented as a single piece (see paragraph I) below).
